



How do I navigate different publication policies?

Student authors already published outside of ProQuest or student authors expecting future publication often have questions about publication rights related to their dissertation or thesis. **It is important that authors understand that they or, in rare cases, the institution, continue to hold the copyright to their content contributed to ProQuest.** ProQuest Dissertations & Theses is a dissemination channel and is not a publisher in the traditional definition applied to journals or monographs.

Generally, the submission of an author's graduate work to the ProQuest platform does not qualify the work as being "published." However, each publisher/editorial board sets its own policy as to whether the dissemination of a dissertation or thesis via ProQuest disqualifies the author from submitting a journal article or monograph on the same subject for future publication. ProQuest has been disseminating dissertations and theses since 1939, and our experience is that most publishers do not find the dissemination of a dissertation or thesis via ProQuest problematic.

If there is concern about publishing the final version of an article as part of a dissertation, ProQuest recommends including the preprint version of the article in the dissertation instead. Publishers do not typically place restrictions on the "preprint" version of the journal article. (The preprint version is the version of a scholarly or scientific paper that is made available before the final, published version. A preprint version is different from the final article, often called the "postprint" or "published version.") While most publishers do not find the wide distribution of a full-text dissertation or thesis problematic, potential conflicts should be carefully considered and explored by students, with the advice of their faculty advisors.

Should concern arise after a student has graduated and their graduate work has been included in ProQuest Dissertations & Theses Global, ProQuest will apply a full-text embargo to the graduate work upon request.
